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#### **PB&P Pup Treats**

2½ c. whole wheat flour 3/4 c. rolled oats

2 lg. eggs

1 heaping c. canned pumpkin

3 heaping tbsp. peanut butter

½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. cinnamon

- Preheat oven to 350°F.
- Mix ingredients together. Add water as needed to make dough workable, but keep it dry and stiff.
- Roll dough until ½-in. thick and cut out with bone-shaped cookie cutter.
- Bake 35-40 min., until biscuits are hard.

## making the Dog Park Fun

Want to be sure your trip to the dog park is a success? Here are some pointers for you:

- \* Be sure your dog has a good recall and knows what you mean when you ask her to "settle down."
- \* If your dog's not very big, see if there are special park times reserved for the small fries or a section that's just for them. It's far too easy for the little dogs to get overwhelmed or bowled over by the bigger guys, and you want this to be a great outing for your pup.
- \* Before you both enter, check the safety and layout of the park and observe how the other dogs are behaving.
- \* Once you're both comfortable, take your pup off the leash if it's allowed. Otherwise, your dog may get tangled up in it, causing her stress.
- \* Don't zone out with your friends or your phone keep your attention on your dog to be sure she's safe and having a good time.
- \* Maintain your connection by calling your pup back to you from time to time and playing a quick game or giving her a few pets before sending her back to romp.
- \* Avoid becoming part of a clump of people and dogs grouped together in too small an area. This can lead to doggy spats and an unhappy experience for your pup.
- \* Save the treats and toys for home there's too much potential for dogs to start stealing or guarding behavior, leading to aggression.
- \* Always clean up after your dog and ask the other pet parents to do the same. The dog park won't be enjoyable if it's not maintained and poop-free.



\* And remember, if it's no longer fun, it's time to go. Some days, your dog just isn't into it or other dogs are acting up, so be ready to leave when she stops enjoying the experience. If your dog's having a blast, though, consider staying a little longer then you'd planned. But if you become concerned about anything, leave immediately – your #1 priority is to keep your pup safe.

# BRRR... It's Cold Outside:

The cold Chicagoland winters can be a serious threat to your pup's health. Just like you, dogs are susceptible to frostbite and hypothermia and should be kept inside as much as possible on winter days. No pet should be left outside for long periods in below-freezing weather, no matter what their breed or type of fur.

You can make sure your dog is safe with a few precautions. Keep an eye on her cold tolerance and adjust her outdoor activities accordingly to avoid frostbite and hypothermia.

You may need to shorten your walks with your pup, especially on particularly cold days. If your dog is very young or old, or has arthritis, she may have trouble on snow and ice-covered walkways. Conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, kidney disease, and hormonal imbalances, like Cushing's disease, can make it harder for your dog to regulate her body temperature so she's more susceptible to temperature extremes.

Remember, even if your dog has long, thick fur, she'll still feel the cold! And if her legs are short and her body's low to the ground, the shivers will set in even faster. She may need a sweater or coat to handle the cold outside. And make sure it's dry from her last outing – putting your dog into a damp coat will actually make her colder.

Wipe your dog's paws, legs and belly when she comes inside to remove deicers, antifreeze, and other toxic chemicals that could poison her if she licks them. Also, check her pads for any signs of cracks or bleeding, because ice and snow can accumulate between her toes. Putting her in booties or clipping the fur between her pads can help avoid injuries.

You might want to move your pup's bed to a warmer spot in the house, too. If you keep the thermostat low to save on the heating costs, consider putting your dog in a sweater indoors, as well.

In case your pup gets loose and needs help finding her way back to you, make sure she's microchipped and her name tag has your current contact information. And don't leave her in a parked car when it's cold, especially if she's very young, old or in compromised health. Your vehicle will lose heat quickly, and she could soon be facing a very dangerous situation.

Stay alert to the warning signs of hypothermia – if your dog is whining, shivering, seems anxious, slows down or stops moving, seems weak, or starts looking for warm places to burrow, get her inside *immediately*. Frostbite is harder to detect, and you may not know she has it until a few days later. If you suspect your pup has hypothermia or frostbite, take her to your vet right away.



Warm car engines are an attractive source of warmth for cats trying to escape the winter cold, so take precautions when starting your vehicle. Before turning the key, check under your car, bang on the hood and honk your horn to shoo them out of danger.

## **Traveling for the Holidays?**

If you take your dog on the road with you, be sure to take precautions.

**Over state lines or across the border –** Your dog will need a health certificate from your veterinarian, regardless if you're going by plane or car. Check the requirements of the areas you're traveling through, as well as your final destination, and take care of the necessary vaccinations and paperwork well in advance.



**Going by car –** Your dog should always be safely restrained in a secure harness or a carrier in a spot clear of all airbags. Don't leave her alone in the car in any weather. And absolutely never transport your pup in the bed of a truck.

**Traveling by air –** First, talk with your vet. Air travel could put your four-footed friend at risk, especially if she's a short-nosed pup. Your vet can advise you on your dog's ability to travel by air.

**Wearing ID** – Make sure your pup has up-to-date identification, with the current address and your mobile number. And when's the last time you checked to see if the contact information linked to her microchip is correct? If she's not microchipped, now's the time to get that done.



**Packing for your pooch** – Along with her food, treats, medications, toys, bed and leash, bring copies of her medical records, photos and information to help identify your dog if she gets lost, and a doggy first-aid kit.

**If your pup is staying behind at a boarding kennel –** Ask your vet how to best protect her from the **canine flu** and other contagious diseases. And make sure

she's up-to-date on all her vaccinations to keep her safe while you're gone.





Pick a Toy Your Dog Will LOVE

Toys make the world go around for your dog – she can make them bounce, roll and fly into the air. They inspire her to play, enrich her training, stave off boredom and curb problem behaviors before they get started.

Some dogs want toys they can sink their teeth into, others prefer soft toys that don't hurt their gentle mouths, and then there are the pups that want to chase flying frisbees, run after bouncing balls, and play tug o' war with their two and fourfooted friends.

Knowing your dog's preferences can give you a big head start in selecting the right toy, and her style of play should be your guide. Even a small dog can be a power chewer, so choose accordingly! Her life stage may also be a consideration – young pups may want something to gnaw on that will massage their gums, while older girls with dull teeth might be happier with soft, stuffed toys.

Before you buy, check the toy carefully. If it has an obvious smell, it might have chemical residue. Bright colors could be the result of toxic or irritating dyes that could leach into your dog's mouth when wet. Beware of fire retardants and stain guards which could contain formaldehyde and other chemicals; check the labels and manufacturer's website for information.

When you're picking out your pup's fun new addition to her toy box:

- Select toys that match your dog's play style.
- Keep a variety of toys on hand and rotate them to keep your dog interested.
- And remember, toys are no substitute for your attention and interaction!




## Pumpkin Ginger Treats

3 c. whole wheat flour
1/2 tsp. ground ginger
1/2 c. pumpkin
1 large egg, beaten
1 tbsp. coconut oil, melted
1/4 to 1/2 c. water

- Preheat oven to 275°F.
- Combine flour and ginger. In a separate bowl, mix pumpkin, egg and coconut oil. Add the flour mixture and mix until crumbly. With the mixer on low, slowly add water 1 tbsp. at a time until dough comes together but isn't sticky.
- On a floured surface, roll out the dough to 1/4-in. thickness and cut with a cookie cutter. If you're using a bone shape, press holes in the center with a fork.
- Place 2 in. apart on ungreased baking sheets. Bake until the bottoms are lightly browned (the tops might crack) and the biscuits feel firm when pressed, about 2 1/2 hours.
