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**Dog Pretzels** 

1 egg 1 cup unsweetened applesauce 2 cups oat flour 3/4 cup rolled oats

Preheat oven to 350°F and line baking sheet with parchment paper.

Mix applesauce, flour, and oats in large bowl. Beat egg, reserve 1 tbsp. and add the rest to bowl.

Stir mixture until dough is tacky but not sticky. Adjust flour as needed.

Roll 2 tbsp. of dough into 10 in. long tube the width of a pencil. To shape into pretzel, form a U, twist ends together, fold back to top, and pinch in ends. Repeat with remaining dough.

Place on baking sheet and brush with reserved egg.

Bake 25-30 minutes until brown and crispy, then cool.

Store in airtight container up to 2 weeks.



### Winning the Fight with Parvo

Parvovirus is by far one of the most vicious and deadly illnesses in the canine world. Highly contagious, it spreads quickly and easily from one dog to another. Dogs of any age are vulnerable, but it is especially lethal in puppies too young to be vaccinated against it. The initial symptoms include lethargy, lack of appetite, vomiting and

diarrhea and then progress to GI bleeding, bloody diarrhea, dehydration, shock and sepsis. Left untreated, the mortality rate can be as high as 91%. The U.S. has seen an estimated 900 cases of this aggressive virus a day – well over 300,000 cases a year, which are often fatal.

Until recently, there was no treatment – the vets could only provide care for the symptoms and try to prevent the virus from spreading. However, a new monoclonal antibody treatment is now available from Elanco Animal Health, Inc. that targets canine parvovirus through a single intravenous dose. This new therapy not only prevents the virus from spreading through the dog's cells, it also resolves symptoms more quickly, shortening the course of the disease. *In the clinical trials, every single dog treated with the medication survived.* 

The medication has conditional USDA approval now and is already available to veterinary clinics for use with their patients. Full USDA approval is expected this year.





#### **Sweet Potato Biscuits**

- 2 medium sweet potatoes
- 1 teaspoon chicken bouillon powder
- 2 cups gluten-free oat flour, plus extra for dusting
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 2 teaspoons baking soda

Poke sweet potatoes with fork, wrap in foil and bake until done, about 1 hour. Unwrap and cool.

Scoop insides into bowl and mash, making 1¾ cups puree. Stir bouillon into 1 cup hot water, add to bowl and whisk until smooth.

Stir in flour, rolled oats and baking soda to form dough. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate 2 hours or overnight.

Preheat the oven to 425°F, then reduce to 350°F. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper.

Lightly flour work surface, divide dough in half and roll out to ½-inch thick. Cut out with dog bone cookie cutter. Lay treats on baking sheets.

Bake until golden brown and crisp, 25 to 30 minutes. Let cool.

Store at room temperature in airtight container for 4 to 5 days. Makes 40.



## Avoid the Drama When Fido Meets Garfield

How do you introduce your dog to a new feline member of the family? Here's how you can reduce the stress and potential conflict:

- 1. Begin by placing your cat inside a bedroom and closing the door.
- 2. Next, bring your dog to the outside of the door and see how he reacts when he smells your new kitty. Repeat this for several days.
- If your dog stays calm, put him on a leash and crack the door open a couple of inches to let them see and smell each other, continuing this for a couple of days.
- 4. If your dog continues to stay calm, the next step is to open the door wider and let them get a really good look at each other, again, keeping your dog on a leash. Repeat each day for a week.
- 5. The last step is to hold your cat and let your dog approach, petting your pup if he remains calm.

If at any stage your dog becomes excited or aggressive, you may need to back up and try that step again. Taking care with the introduction can prevent many problems now and in the future.

#### **Housetraining Tips**

Have a new dog or puppy that needs potty training? Below are some ideas to help him learn the rules!

Don't give your pup water too close to bedtime. To avoid accidents on the floor or extra trips outdoors during the night, stop watering your dog about 2 hours before lights out. Taking him out at regular times every day will help him get used to doing his business on schedule. For the first few days, you may also want to leash your dog to you indoors so you're always aware of where he is and he can't sneak off to potty in the corner.

Feed him in the crate. Dogs don't usually like to eat and potty in the same place. (This also provides a positive experience that helps with crate training!) Be sure to pick up any leftover food once he's finished. When your dog's ready for a potty break, take him outside immediately to avoid an accident.

**Keep him on a consistent eating schedule.** Morning and evening is usually best, although young puppies need to eat more often. A consistent eating schedule will help create a regular potty schedule.

Be ready with the right response, since accidents may not be avoidable at first. Housetraining is a process that can take time for success, and sometimes a refresher course is needed. So, what do you do when your dog has an accident? Leash him to a chair, table leg or another hard-to-move object that's next to the soiled spot and leave him there about 20 minutes

(longer times will reduce the impact). Your dog won't want to stay near the stinky evidence, which makes the lesson more effective.





#### **Be Prepared for a Disaster**

You never know when a disaster is going to strike, and your dog is even more vulnerable than his human companions. It's up to you to be ready to take care of him in an emergency.

**Create an emergency kit** – Have a "go bag" packed and ready for your dog that you can quickly grab in an emergency which includes:

- Food and water for at least 2 weeks
- Travel bowls
- · Medications, for at least 2 months
- Crate or pet carrier
- Pet ID tag, collar & leash, plus extras, just in case
- First-aid kit
- Vaccination and other medical records
- Poop bags
- Brushes and cleaning wipes
- Toys and treats
- Towels or blankets
- Current photos of your dog

Be sure to check the contents of the emergency pack frequently to ensure the food and medications haven't expired. If you know a disaster is approaching, put the bag near the door where you can find and grab it quickly. And be sure your pooch is microchipped so you can be reunited with him if you're separated during a disaster.








#### **How You Know Your Pup Truly Trusts You**

There are several signs that your dog not only loves his new family, but has also given you his trust. That's a huge deal, since he relies on you for his shelter, care and emotional security. The first sign of trust is when your dog *knows* the daily routine – the time to wake up, go for a walk, have his meals and go to bed. Other signs include swiping your shoes or clothing, reacting to your body language and sleeping in the same room with you. Another really strong sign is making eye contact with you. This releases oxytocin, often referred to as the "love hormone," in both you and your dog. Your dog also demonstrates his trust in you with touch, such as leaning into you and cuddling close.

If your dog cowers or shakes, it could be an indication of anxiety or fear of a human, another dog or a perceived threat. Other signals of fear might be aggressive behavior, like barking or lunging, especially when his fur and tail are raised and his teeth are displayed. Less obvious signs of discomfort include recurring licking, panting, moving slowly and acting like he's on high alert. Refusing food, pacing and keeping his distance are additional indications of nervousness.

Just like with your human friends, your dog may need some time to get to know his new family and build a strong, loving relationship with you. But taking care to create close ties with your four-legged buddy now will lead to a tight bond and a sweet future ahead!












**Have a plan ready in advance** – Figure out the best escape route, checking to see which places will welcome pets. Your dog won't understand what's going on and will probably be confused or scared and may become defensive, aggressive or try to escape. Be sure to secure him with a leash or in a pet carrier immediately if you're going to evacuate.

Many shelters will not accept dogs or cats, so you might consider pet-friendly motels, as well as the homes of friends and family. If the situation is immediate and you're scrambling to locate a shelter that can temporarily take care of your dog, call 211 to be connected to community services that might be able to help. Veterinary hospitals, kennels and animal shelters often open their doors to provide temporary havens in disaster situations. If you need to shelter in place, take your pets to an interior room, away from flying debris. If there's a flood risk, go to the highest floor, preferably with some type of exterior access.


Work out a backup system – Create a plan for your neighbors, friends or relatives to evacuate your dog if you're away from home during an emergency. Let them know where your emergency pet kit is and where to meet once it's safe. This gives your dog designated caregivers who will quickly step in to help and provide him with another layer of security.



Beware of hazards during and after a disaster - Steer your dog around anything that could harm him on the ground, from hazardous debris to spilled chemicals, sewage water and downed power lines. His curiosity could easily lead to him into peril.
