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Veggie **Pup Treats**



1/4 c. peanut butter

2 lg. eggs

½ c. old fashioned oats

3+ c. whole wheat flour

1 carrot

1 zucchini

1 c. baby spinach

Preheat oven to 350°F.

Beat pumpkin, peanut butter and eggs 1-2 min.

Gradually add oats and 2½ c. flour on low speed until mixed. Add another $\frac{1}{4}$ c. flour at a time until dough is not sticky. Mix in chopped spinach and peeled and shredded carrot and zucchini.

Knead dough 3-4 times on lightly floured surface: roll out to 1/4-in. thick. Cut out with cookie cutter and place on baking sheet lined with parchment paper.

Bake 20-25 min. until edges are golden brown. Cool.

Guarding Against Avian Flu

The avian flu (a.k.a., bird flu) has become a major concern for everyone with pets, especially since it has affected multiple species.

Here are some guidelines for protecting your fourfooted family members:

- Keep your dog and cat away from wild birds, especially sick or dead birds.
- Don't allow your pets to eat raw poultry or wild birds.
- If you feed birds in your yard, keep the feeding area clean and make sure your pets stay away from that area.
- To avoid spreading any contaminants, wash your hands after handling your pets, especially after they go outside.
- Consider keeping your cats inside.

Contact your vet immediately if your pet may have been exposed to wild birds and shows any of the following symptoms:

- · Lethargy or unusual tiredness
- Decreased appetite
- Coughing, sneezing, difficulty breathing or other respiratory issues
- Runny nose or eyes
- Fever
- Tremors or seizures



Microchip Company Closure

Is your pet's microchip from Save This Life, a company that abruptly shut down in February? Then you're among the thousands of affected pet owners and your pup or cat is now at risk of being unable to find their way home if they become lost.

If you're not sure what company your microchip is from, ask your vet to scan your pet and provide the microchip ID number. If it starts with either 991 or 900164, it's likely you'll need to re-register it. To be sure, you can enter the ID number into a search engine, such as Google, and it will tell you which company is associated with your pet's microchip.

The good news is that – instead of having a new microchip implanted – you can re-register your pet's current microchip with another company. While some companies will register it free, such as freepetchipregistry.com, 24PetWatch and Findpet, others will charge a registration fee, like PetLink. Entertaining Your Pup at Home

If it's too hot, too cold, raining, muddy or you just want to stay put, you can use the following ideas to keep your dog engaged and enriched:

- Interactive distractions Interactive toys often dispense treats, while puzzles reward your pup only after he figures out how they work. Both make challenging and mind stimulating entertainment.
- Scent games By creating your own simple scent games, you can trigger your pup's foraging instincts. Just hide treats around the house and encourage him to find them; increase the difficulty level by using different rooms and harder-to-reach places.
 - Rotating toys every week Just like people, dogs can become bored with the same things to play with day in and day out. Introducing "new" toys a few weeks down the road will reignite your pup's interest and curiosity in toys he hasn't seen for awhile.
- Teaching new tricks or practicing old ones Training is mentally stimulating for your dog and reinforces good behavior. He'll enjoy learning something new or practicing a trick he hasn't done lately, whether it's "rollover" and "shake" or "sit" and "heel" – because you're doing it together.
- Indoor obstacle courses Using pillows, chairs and blankets, you can create tunnels, jumps and obstacles for your pup to navigate. It will entertain him, challenge his problem-solving abilities and burn off pent-up energy.

• Relaxing massages – A low-energy pastime like a massage also has valuable benefits for your pooch. It can stress and strengthen your bond - leaving you both relaxed enhance his circulation, relieve and happy!

PB Pupper Cakes

Pupper Cakes:

1/4 c. peanut butter

½ c. applesauce

½ c. plain yogurt

½ c. shredded carrots 1 egg

½ tsp. baking soda

3/4 c. whole wheat flour Honey (optional)

Frostina:

½ c. peanut butter

1 c. plain Greek yogurt

2 Tbsp. honey

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F and line muffin tin with cupcake liners.
- 2. Mix peanut butter, applesauce and yogurt until well combined.
- 3. Whisk in egg, then add carrots and mix.
- 4. Sift in flour and baking soda. Use spatula to blend until just mixed (do not overmix).
- 5. Pour batter into muffin tin, and bake for 25-30 min. or toothpick comes out clean.
- 6. Let rest 10 min., then remove from pan and cool
- 7. To make frosting, whisk honey, yogurt and peanut butter until well mixed.
- 8. Apply frosting and serve to your happy dog!

Get Kids Involved in Training

Involving your kids in training your dog is a great way to teach them responsibility, patience and kindness toward animals.

Start by having your child train your pup simple commands, such as "sit". Have her hold a treat just above your dog's nose, then slowly move it back over his head. That should have him rocking back into a sitting position. To teach him "down", she should hold the treat in front of your pup's nose, then drop her hand to the ground. Your dog will follow the treat and lie

down. Be sure to remind your kids to give your fourfooted buddy lots of praise each time he performs a command.

Have your child feed your dog, too, making sure she keeps to a regular

schedule for the best results. Walks and picking up after your dog are also good ways to involve your child in training. Depending on her age and size, though, you may need to provide some assistance.

By involving your kids in training, they'll recognize your dog is an important member of your family and become great pet parents when they're grown!















Pet Sitter's Checklist

Leaving your pup in the care of a pet sitter when the family goes on vacation? To be sure your sitter has the info she needs, leave a helpful checklist with all the details to keep your dog happy! It should include:

- Details of your pup's routine Keeping to the same times your dog is fed and walked will reduce his stress
 and make it easier for your sitter to keep him happy and comfortable.
- Your house rules Your dog may push the boundaries while you're away unless you cue in your sitter as to what is and is *not* allowed, from sleeping on the couch to devouring his treats on the living room rug.
- Any conditions and medications Giving your dog his prescribed dosage at the regular time is important to maintain his health while you're gone.
- Emergency contact info Make sure your sitter knows how to reach you and your veterinarian if any questions or issues arise. You don't want to be out of touch if your dog becomes sick or is injured. And be sure to leave a credit card authorization with your vet's office and a signed letter giving them permission to charge the card if your dog needs emergency care.

In addition to the checklist, look around your home to ensure all dangerous cleaning products, pesticides and medications are stored out of reach of your dog. Plus, check that any possible escape holes have been fixed in your backyard fence and gate. You don't want your dog getting lost while you're out of town!


Also, be sure there's enough food, medications, doggy bags and other supplies to keep your dog and sitter going in case you're delayed returning home.

Ways to Make Your Dog Happier

Small little things can make your pup's tail wag with joy! Here's how you can increase his happiness:

- Stick to a consistent routine for meals, walks and bedtime to reduce his uncertainty, relieve his stress and make him feel secure.
- Give him plenty of time to sniff, explore and experience the world on walks to provide mental stimulation and keep him engaged.
- Give your dog a comfortable, quiet space that's just for him where he feels safe.
- Feed your pup nutritious food to ensure he's healthy and energetic and avoid health issues.
- Assign him a job or purpose to build his confidence and prevent boredom from setting in even if it's just learning a new trick, sitting before meals or fetching the paper.
- Use positive reinforcement and avoid harsh corrections to foster his enthusiasm and avoid creating fear and confusion. You'll build his trust when he associates you with safety.


 Make vet visits less scary by bringing treats, using a calm voice and handling your dog gently to create positive associations and prevent anxiety and fear.
